

- Propane tanks \$5/20 lbs.
- Televisions & Computers \$10/unit
- Tires (16" diameter or less) \$2/tire
- Tires (Over 16" diameter) \$5/tire
- Tires (Large Equipment) \$25/tire

## Reduce and Reuse What can I do?

- Buy in bulk
- Buy re-usable instead of disposable (water bottles, coffee cups, cleaning rags instead of paper towels...)
- Take your own bag to the store
- Compost your kitchen scraps and yard waste

- Take unwanted items in good condition to a thrift shop
- Share big items like a rototiller with a neighbor
- Rent big items like a pressure washer
